DV RELATED LEGISLATION

2022

AB 547: Domestic Violence Victims Rights <u>If the victim has requests</u>, it requires the county probation department to notify a victim of domestic violence or stalking:

- of the perpetrator's current community of residence or proposed community of residence upon release
- when the perpetrator is placed on or released on probation

The District Attorney must advise these victims of their right to request and receive such notification.

AB 2870: Firearms: Gun Violence Restraining Orders Allows a petition for gun violence restraining orders to be made by:

- an individual who has a child in common with the subject,
- an individual who has a dating relationship with the subject,
- or a roommate of the subject of the petition, as specified.

The law expands the family members who can file a petition to include any person related by consanguinity or affinity within the 4th degree who has had substantial and regular interactions with the subject for at least one year. AB 2185: Forensic Examinations: Domestic Violence Victims

- Requires that victims of domestic violence have access to medical evidentiary examinations, free of charge, by trained Sexual Assault Response Teams (SART)
- Makes specified changes to forms, including requiring that the forms include information regarding history and evidence of strangulation
- Requires a hospital, clinic, or other emergency medical facility where the medical evidentiary examinations are conducted to develop and implement written policies and procedures for maintaining the confidentiality of medical evidentiary examination reports

SB 863: Domestic Violence Death Review Teams Authorizes domestic violence death review teams to assist local agencies in identifying and reviewing domestic violence near-death cases

- Prohibits near-death reviews from occurring before any prosecution has concluded
- Prohibits the compelled participation of any near-death survivors in death review team investigations
- Includes a confidentiality provision that protects statements provided by a survivor in a near-death review case review

AB 2369: Domestic Violence Prevention/ Attorneys Fees and Costs

- After notice and a hearing, and upon request, requires a court to issue an order for the payment of attorney's fees and costs for a prevailing petitioner <u>only if</u> the respondent establishes by a preponderance of the evidence that the petition or request is frivolous or solely intended to abuse, intimidate, or cause unnecessary delay.
- Requires the court, before awarding attorney's fees and costs, to first find that the party ordered to pay has, or is reasonably likely to have, the ability to pay.

AB 2391: Civil Actions: Vexatious Litigants Authorizes a person protected by a restraining order issued after a hearing pursuant to identified provisions to file a petition, without fee, to have the person who is the subject of that order declared a vexatious litigant if, while the restraining order is still in place, they commence, prosecute, or maintain litigation against the person protected by the restraining order that is determined to be meritless and causes the person protected by the order to be harassed or intimidated.

SB 1017: Leases: Termination of Tenancy-Abuse or Violence Existing law limits the amount of rent for which the tenant is responsible to not more than 14 calendar days after the notice is given and requires the tenant to be released from responsibility for making other rent payments under the lease, as specified. This law makes a landlord or agent liable to the tenant for actual damages and, except as specified, statutory damages of not less than \$100 and not more than \$5,000 in a civil action for violation of these provisions.

Prohibits a landlord from terminating or failing to renew a tenancy based on an act of abuse or violence, as defined, against a:

• tenant,

- a tenant's immediate family member, as defined,
- or a tenant's household member, as specified.

Makes a landlord's violation of those provisions an affirmative defense to a cause of action for unlawful detainer.

SB 935: Domestic Violence Protective Orders Existing law authorizes protective orders may be renewed, upon the request of either party, for either 5 years or permanently, subject to termination or modification as specified

This law specifies that a party may request a protective order be renewed for 5 *or more* years, or permanently, at the discretion of the court, subject to termination, modification, or subsequent renewal AB 2791: Sheriffs: Service of Process and Notices

- Requires the sheriff to accept an electronic signature on a document requesting the sheriff to serve court documents, or on a summons, order, or other notice to be served
- Prohibits the sheriff from reviewing the substance of a summons, order, or other notice except for specified criteria
- Requires the Judicial Council to create, on or before January 1,
 2024, a form or forms required to be used by litigants in civil actions or proceedings to request service of process or notice by the sheriff
 - The bill requires all requests to the sheriff for service of a notice or other process to be made on the Judicial Council form or forms
 - Would prohibit a sheriff from requiring completion of a form or request other than the Judicial Council form or forms

AB 2791: Sheriffs: Service of Process and Notices • Beginning on January 1, 2024, and until January 1, 2026, require the sheriff to accept transmission by email, fax, or in-person delivery of the Judicial Council form or forms described above and of a summons, order, or other notice to be served in any case in which a litigant who has been granted a fee waiver by an order on court fee waiver or is otherwise exempt by law from paying fees

- Prohibit the Sheriff from collecting fees for electronic transmission of the documents.
- Beginning on January 1, 2026, requires the sheriff to accept, in all cases, transmission by email, fax, or in-person delivery of the Judicial Council form or forms described above and of a summons, order, or other notice to be served
 - Authorize the sheriff to charge a fee for the electronic transmission of documents up to the actual cost incurred in processing the transmission, except as specified.

AB 2085: Mandated Reporters/ Definition of Neglect

Limits the definition of general neglect to only include circumstances where the child is at substantial risk of suffering serious physical harm or illness

 Says that general neglect does not include a parent's economic disadvantage
