

#### The FAIR Education Act and Beyond: A Brief Timeline

- Vetoed 2006, Passed in 2011, Effective in 2012
  - Revised California Education Code 51204.5: Requires history/social studies education to include social, political, and economic roles and contributions of LGBT people and people w/ disabilities. With others in Ed Code, emphasizes how this shapes contemporary society.
  - Mandates schools not adopt learning materials with discriminatory bias or negative stereotypes on gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, or disability.
- ▶ 2016: Aligned CA State History-Social Science Framework
- 2017: Textbooks Aligned to FAIR-Inclusive Framework Approved
- ▶ 2017-2020: Framework Implementation Trainings and District Textbook Adoptions
- ▶ 2020: Other States Begin Implementation (NJ, with CO, IL, and MD in process)

## Axioms of K-12 Study of Gender and Sexuality in US History

- Family Diversity Is Social Reality
- 1. Gender is Diverse, Disciplinary, and Innovative
- 1. Sexuality Is a Central Field of Social Power and Meaning Making
- 1. Power, Identity, and History Are Intersectional
- 1. LGBTQ People Have a Past that Produces the Present and Informs Possible Futures
- 1. Students Should Explore These Concepts in Grade, Middle, and High School
- 1. All of the Above Matters to All Students. It Matters Especially to Some.

## Searching for Primary Sources: Tips for K-12 Teachers

- ► Get the Low-Hanging Fruit: Instagram, Podcasts, Exhibitions
- Digitized, Easily Searchable Archives (OAC, LOC, Outhistory, Digital Transgender Archive)
- Search Terms Vary Widely: Gay, Homosexual, Lesbian, Transgender, Transsexual, Bisexual, but also Invert, Pervert, Sex Perversion, Crossdresser, Female Impersonator (for example)
- Search by Key Historical People and Events (Ma Rainey, Lavender Scare, Bayard Rustin, Sylvia Rivera, Defense of Marriage Act)
- Don't Reinvent the Wheel!





