	<ul> <li>Farms that house 5 or more farmworkers are required to be registered with Environmental Health permit programs.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>The Taskforces has not red-tagged any housing units to-date. None have been comparable to the conditions of the Mushroom Farm – the location where the shooting took place.</li> </ul>
	• Want to create the base line of understanding of the condition of the type and number of farmworker units on agricultural lands.
	<ul> <li>Looking at findings at staff level – are there any things we can do at county gov level to help improve the condition of farmworker housing units.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>The County welcomes questions, input, and thoughts; and will be going to PMAC, Farm Bureau, Agricultural Advisory Committee, and potential additional community meetings to get public and stakeholder input on</li> </ul>

Presented by Sandra Firpo, Department of Emergency Management	<ul> <li>The San Mateo County Department of Emergency Management (DEM) evolved since its creation in the 1950's. Its purpose at the time was to inform people on what to do during a disaster.</li> <li>The current mission is to enhance the safety and resilience of the community in every phase of disaster preparedness.</li> <li>DEM are not responders rather they support the cities and unincorporated areas throughout the San Mateo County.</li> <li>DEM manages alerts and the software but are not the only agency who sends the alerts.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Many agencies have authorizations to send communications.</li> <li>To best be informed, it's essential to have various methods to receive notifications and alerts.</li> <li>SMC Alert and Genesys Protect are 2 examples on where to receive information.         <ul> <li>People can register to SMC Alert for Spanish alerts.</li> </ul> </li> <li>DEM seeks the feedback from people on their experiences with the</li> </ul>

# 5. Presentation: Office of Labor Standards Update

Presented by Shireen Malekafzali, Chief Equity Officer	<ul> <li>December 2023, the Board of Supervisors, sponsored by Supervisor Mueller and Supervisor Pine, unanimously voted to establish the Office of Labor Standards and Enforcement (OLSE).</li> <li>The problem - there is not great data.</li> <li>Disproportionately impacts; low wage workers, families struggling to make ends meet, women, people of color, and undocumented immigrants.</li> <li>The State Labor Commission has identified as wage theft is over 4.5 million dollars in the San Mateo County.</li> <li>Working on a phased approach since January to learn from other Labor Standards and Enforcements are doing.</li> <li>Phase 1 includes exploring ideas and focusing on industries identified as problematic such as restaurant workers, farmworkers, and construction workers.</li> <li>Phase 2 implements the data gained from phase 1 to expand partnerships, advise the Board of Supervisors, and expand outreach.</li> <li>Next steps – begin to hire a coordinator position within the Office of Equity and hire additional outreach and educators, the attorney, and to the district attorney's capacity with their deputy in their district attorney's office.</li> <li>Open to feedback for the Spanish name of the Office of Labor Standards and Enforcement (OLSE).</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Option 1: Oficina de Asuntos Laborales</li> <li>Option 2: Oficina de Normas Laborales</li> <li>Option 3: Condado de San Mateo Oficina de Normas y Cumplimientos Laborales</li> </ul>

	Half Moon Bay and Pescadero.

	the clinic to come 2x or 3x a week.

	distribute a survey for more farmworker input regarding the clinic
	hours? ALAS can support with the survey distribution.

	extending services to Pescadero.
	Stephanie Perez: ALAS helps transport farmworkers with their bus. Is
	there a possibility to bring the clinic to the farms for basic treatment?
