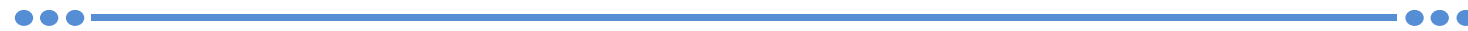

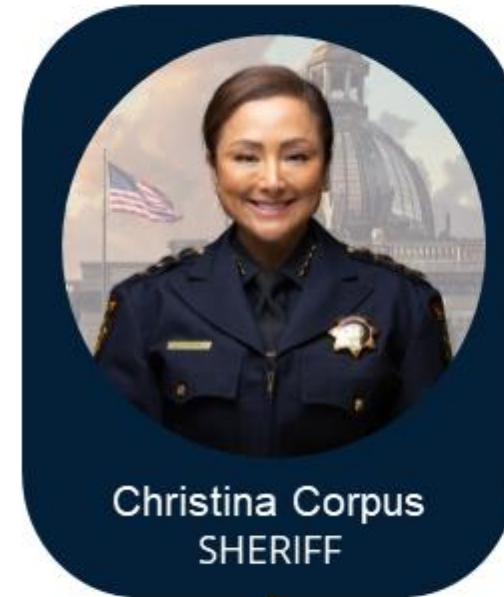

APPLICANTS BY ETHNICITY

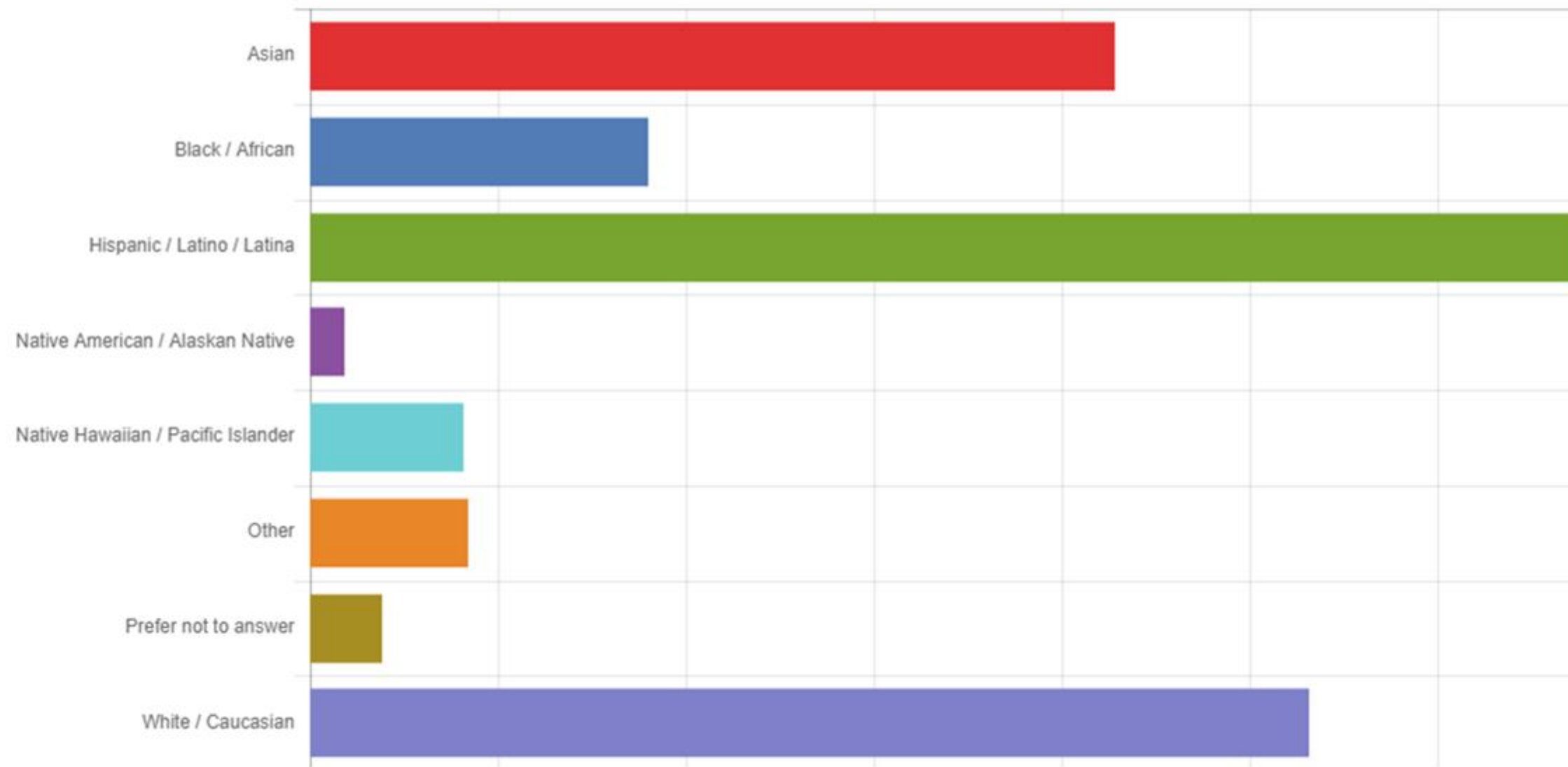

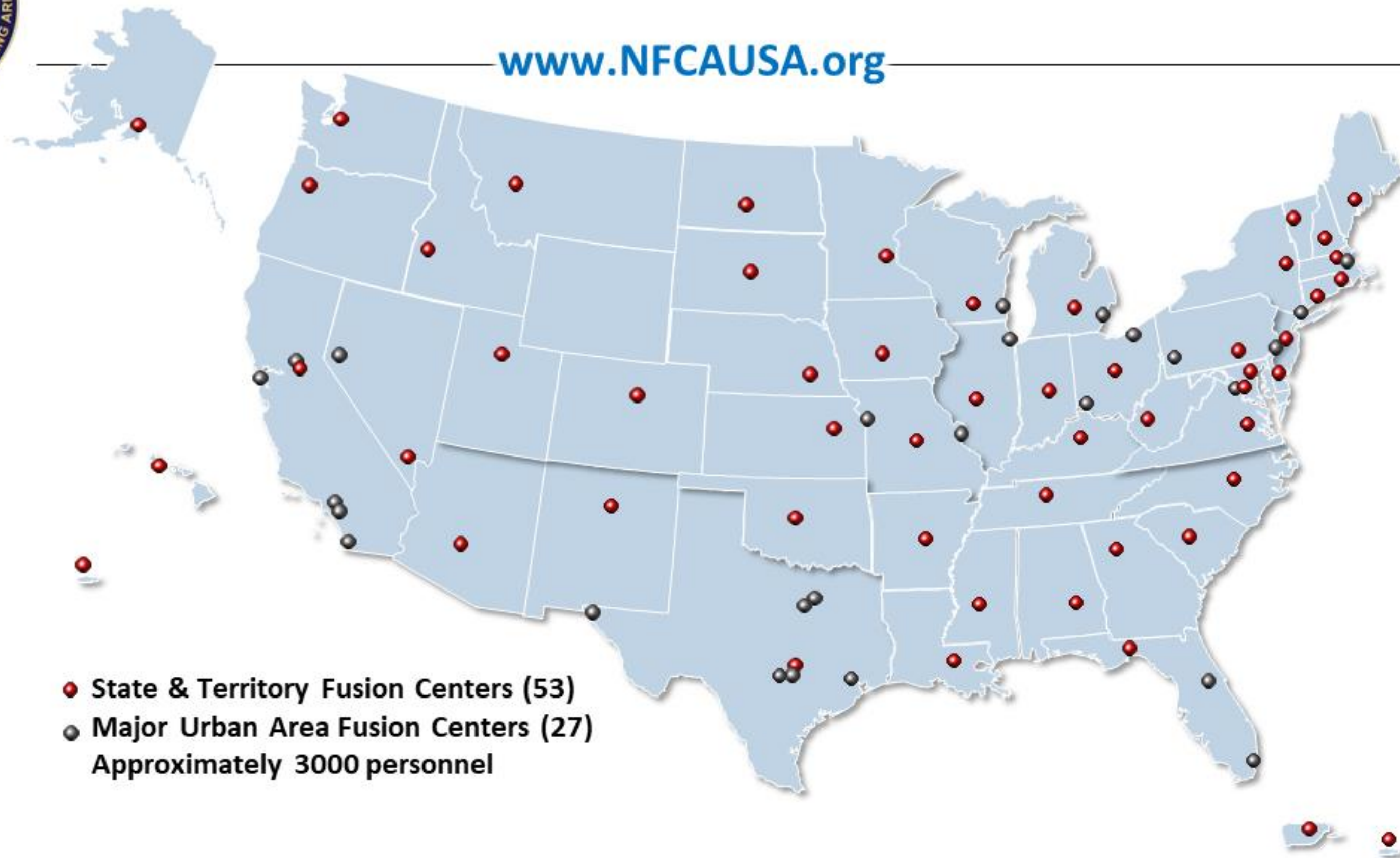

(U) Swatting Threats

(U) Over the past year Swatting Threats have increased as the callers have attempted to direct law enforcement to their victims' home address with the threat that a subject at the residence has weapons and is planning a mass casualty event. The other common swatting calls have been intended to direct law enforcement to religious facilities, schools, or businesses due to bombs planted and/or and active shooter present.₃

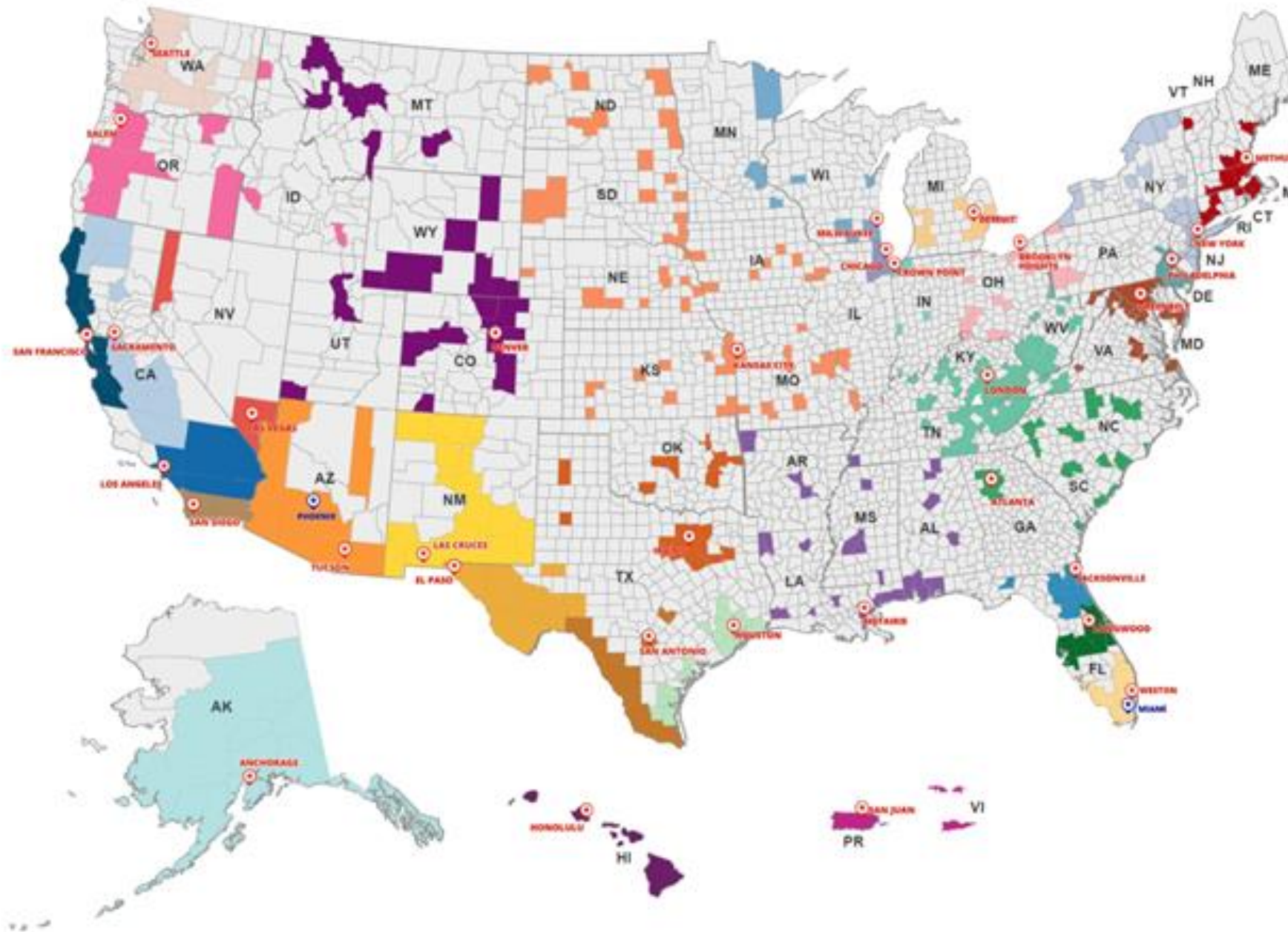


(U) Election Threats

(U) The security of the election process and elected officials is a priority for the Statewide Elections Task Force and our Threat Management Group. Threats to the election and our elected officials have increased from foreign nations and violent extremist across the nation.

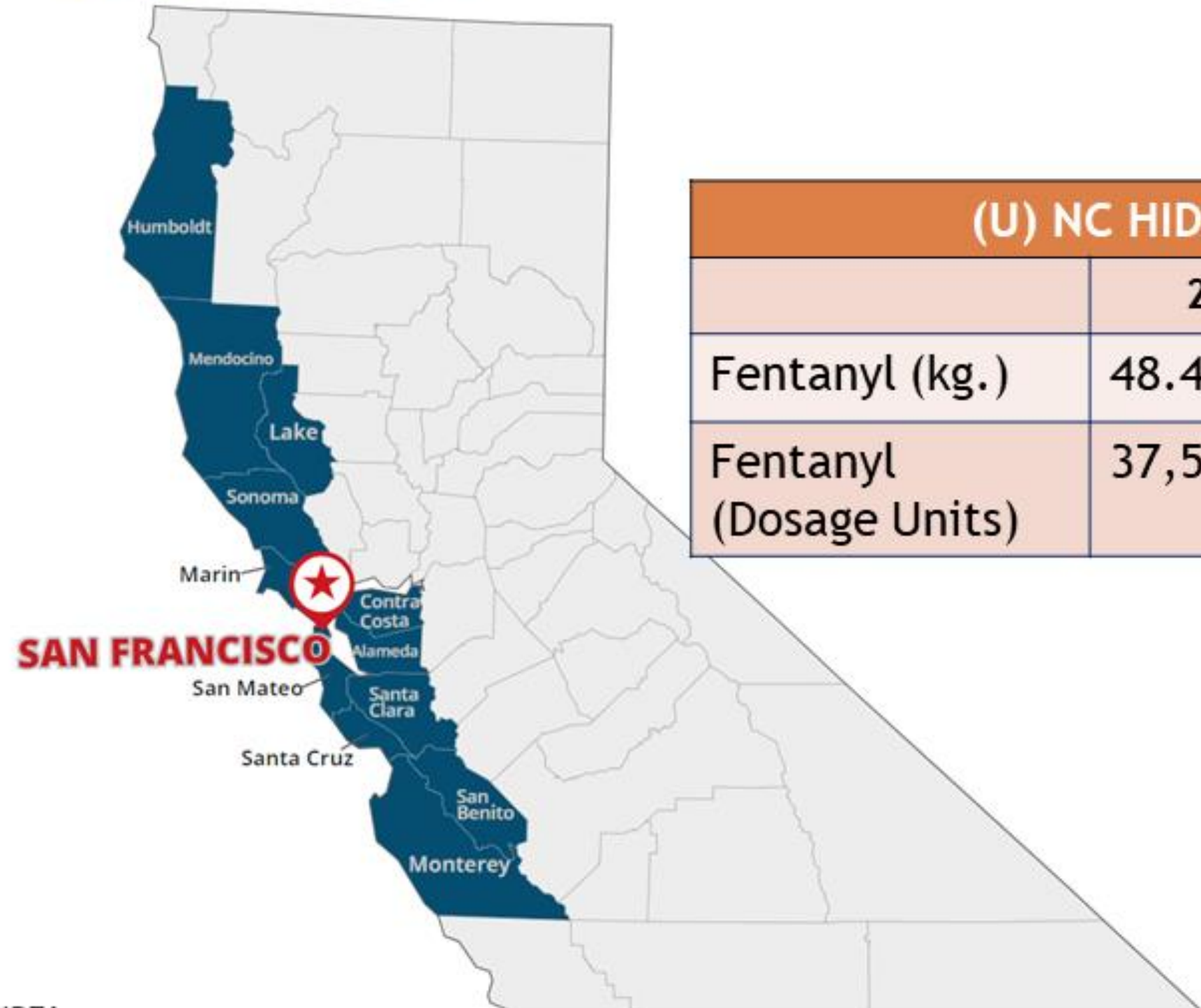

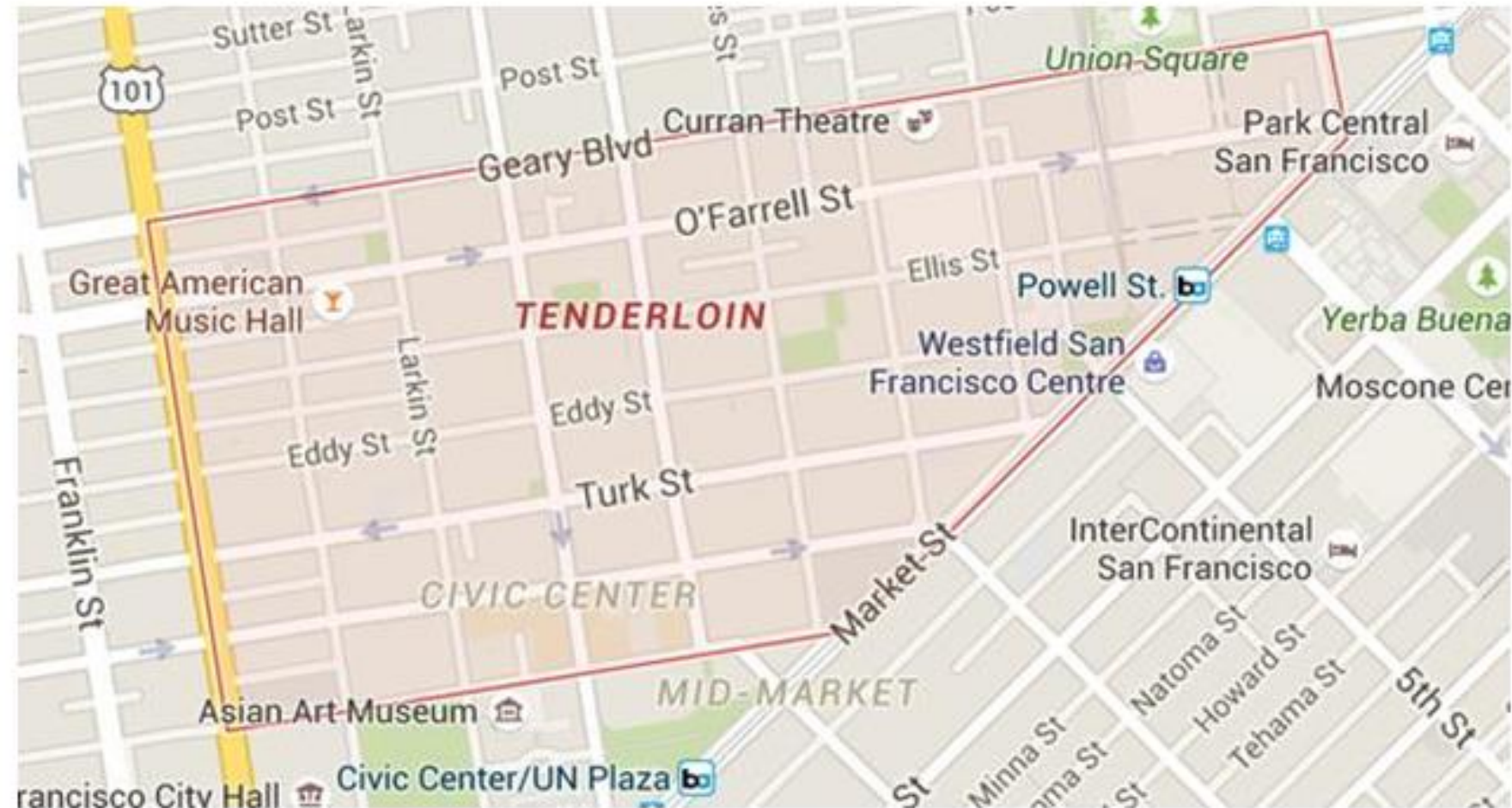

(U) Task Force personnel have seized:

- Fentanyl: 147+ kilos
- Total firearms seized: 34
- Total cash seized: \$943,000

(U) NC HIDTA Investigative Support Center (ISC) analysts assisted this effort by identifying:

- Over 948 individual subjects of investigation identified
- Over 500 subjects have been identified as part of the Honduran organizations operating in the region.



(U) Improving Real-Time Information Sharing

(U) The NCRIC - HIDTA is working with San Mateo County Public Safety Communications to develop real-time overdose reporting alerts through ODMAP and FirstWatch through computer-aided dispatch systems from law enforcement, fire, and emergency medical services dispatch centers. Brief Introduction about BHRS

- **Provide a range of mental health and substance use services**
 - Prevention, early intervention, treatment, crisis, after care services
 - Serious (and Persistent Mental Illness), Severe Emotional Disturbance
 - Substance Use Disorder
 - Safety net services; low income and uninsured
- **Budget of \$340+ million and about 516 staff**
 - Five regional clinics: Daly City, San Mateo, Half Moon Bay, Redwood City and East Palo Alto but also offer community and field-based services
- **Broad range of community mental health and substance use providers**
- **Primary entry point is through Access/Call Center – 1-800-686-0101**
 - Call Center staff will administer screening questions

Mobile Crisis Response Team

New benefit for San Mateo County residents

- Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) requirement began January 2024
- 24/7 non-armed mobile crisis response
- Anyone, anytime, anywhere
- Provide dispatch, mobile response, face-to-face crisis assessment & de-escalation, 5150 evaluation & hold, crisis safety plan, transport, warm hand-off, & post-crisis follow-up
- Response by 2-person mobile team: Behavioral Health clinician and peer specialist
- Partnership with Telecare (Mobile Crisis Team), StarVista (answers 988 and hotline) and BHRS
 - Work with Public Safety Committee (administers 911), Fire Chiefs, Police Chiefs, Emergency Medical Services (ambulance), etc.
- Mobile Crisis Response Team Steering Committee has been meeting since March

Crisis Response Team Services/Activation

- **Activated in response to major community crisis (e.g. mass casualty event) or natural disaster (e.g. wildfire mass evacuation)**
 - Provides short-term crisis response, psychological first aid, and triage services to mitigate psychological reactions and to prevent more serious consequences, referrals to longer term community resources
- Composed of “volunteer” BHRS staff who receive specialized crisis response training

911 Dispatched Crisis Services

Community Wellness Crisis Response Team (CWCRT) Pilot

- Law enforcement/mental health clinician co-response model
- Service areas: Daly City, SSF, San Mateo, RWC, EPA, Pacifica, San Bruno, SM-Foster City, Menlo Park and North Fair Oaks (Sheriff)
- Services: Crisis assessment & de-escalation, 5150 evaluation & writing involuntary hold or safety plan, short-term follow up support & resources referrals
- Dispatched by 911

San Mateo Mental Health Assessment & Referral Team (SMART)

- Transportation alternative to ambulance transport to psychiatric emergency room
- Service area: San Mateo County
- Services: Crisis Intervention Training (CIT)-trained paramedics providing 5150 assessment, writing involuntary hold and providing needed transport in a marked SUV
- Dispatched by 911 per law enforcement request

Psychiatric Emergency Response Team (PERT)

- **Provides mental health crisis call investigation and follow up**
 - Collaboration with Sheriff's Office and BHRS
 - 2 PERT teams (1 BHRS licensed clinician and 1 Sheriff's Detective)
 - Reviews all Sheriff's Office cases involving possible mental illness
 - Investigation and follow-up
 - Connect individuals to behavioral health services and other community resources to help manage crisis, prevent tragic outcomes, reduce hospitalization
- Referrals are from Sheriff's Office and within Sheriff's jurisdiction

Forensic Mental Health

- **Providing forensic mental health and specialty court outpatient services**
- Programs:
 - Service Connect
 - Pathways
 - Pathways Intensive Mental Health Diversion
 - Pathways Mental Health Court
 - Pathways Veteran's Treatment Court
 - Pathways Military Diversion Court
 - Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT)
 - Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment (CARE) Court

Service Connect

- **Collaboration with Human Services Agency and Probation**
- Services offered include mental health counseling, alcohol and drug case management, peer support (and peer mentors), support groups, engagement events, job development, employment training program, (onsite) mobile health clinic
- Referral from Probation or Sheriff's Office or Parole
 - AB109: Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) or Mandatory Supervision
 - Unified Reentry: Moderate to High-Risk Recidivism

Pathways

- **Collaboration with San Mateo County Courts, Probation, District Attorney's Office, Sheriff's Office, Correctional Health Services, NAMI and BHRS (since 2006)**
- Pathways is the **umbrella structure** for a field-based outpatient team that provides services to clients from specialty courts and mental health diversion programs
- Pathways Intensive Mental Health Diversion
- Pathways Mental Health Court
- Pathways Veteran's Treatment Court
- Pathways Military Diversion Court

Pathways Intensive Mental Health Diversion (IMHD)

- Must have a diagnosis of Schizophrenia, Schizoaffective disorder, Bipolar I disorder, PTSD, Major Depressive Disorder
- Must have a felony charge; not on supervised probation (however, Probation provides support in supervision)
- Services include intensive case management, mental health services, SUD support, housing support, social support, etc.
- Program last approximately two years
- **Referral:** Initiated by defendant's attorney for eligibility

Pathways Mental Health Court

- Services include intensive case management, mental health services, SUD support, housing support, social support, etc.
- Program is dependent on the length of probation (about 1-3 years)
- **Referral:** Anyone can refer (family member, attorney, law enforcement, self, etc.)

Pathways Veteran's Treatment Court and Military Diversion Court

- Clients who are Veteran's Administration (VA)-connected receive care through the VA; cannot have dishonorable discharge
- Services include intensive case management, mental health services, intensive supervised probation, SUD support, social support, etc.
- Program is dependent on the length of probation (about 1-3 years) for VTC; Program is 1 year (no more than 2 years); determined by progress for MDC
- **Referral:** Initiated by attorney; reviewed by Public Defender Program for eligibility

Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT)

- **Otherwise known as Laura's Law**
- Severe mental illness; has not followed through with treatment, resulting in:
 - 2 or more psychiatric hospitalizations and/or mental health treatment in a correctional facility in the last 36 months, OR
 - Threatened or attempted a significantly dangerous behavior towards themselves or others at least 1 time in the past 48 months
- Offer FSP-level services: intensive case management, psychiatry/medication management, housing and housing support, educational/employment support, peer support, etc.
 - FSP level of care – more intensive services
- **Referral:** Anyone can refer

Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment (CARE) Court

- Began July 2024; 6 months early implementation (all counties will need to implement by December 2024)
- Person is currently experiencing severe mental illness and has a diagnosis identified in the disorder class: schizophrenia spectrum and other psychotic disorders
- The person is not clinically stabilized in on-going voluntary treatment
- The program will connect a person in crisis to a CARE plan, which will include comprehensive treatment, housing, and supportive services for up to 12 months (but may be extended by Court for an additional 12 months)
- Referrals are made via a written petition to the court
- **Referral:** (Very specific list)

Shelters and Housing

Behavioral Health and Recovery Services contracted shelter beds for clients of BHRS:

- **Navigation Center (7 beds) and Safe Harbor Shelter (5 beds)**
 - Onsite support provided by Adult Resource Management (ARM) Team
- **Mental Health Association Spring Street Shelter (15 beds)**
 - Onsite support provided by Mental Health Association staff

Dedicated Housing:

- BHRS currently has 71 permanent supported housing units built with Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) and No Place Like Home (NPLH) funds in 7 housing developments across the county with another 87 permanent and 29 transitional housing units in 7 new housing developments coming on-line by mid-2026
- **Full-Service Partnership (FSP) Housing:** scattered site housing subsidized through FSP contracted providers

Substance Use Disorder Treatment Continuum

- **Core Treatment Components**

- Assessment and Care Coordination
- Contingency Management/Recovery Incentives (pilot)
- Counseling (Individual and Group)
- Family Therapy
- Medical Psychotherapy (NTP only)
- Medication Services
- Medications for Addiction Treatment (MAT) Alcohol Use Disorder & Opioid Use Disorder
- Observation (Withdrawal Management only)
- Patient Education
- Peer Support Services
- Prescribing and Monitoring for MAT (MAT only)
- Recovery Services (Monitoring & Relapse Prevention)
- SUD Crisis Intervention Services

Justice-Involved Substance Use Disorder Programs

- Deferred Entry of Judgement (DEJ/PC1000) Pre-Trial Diversion
- Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Programs
- BHRS AOD Collaborative Courts: Drug Court & Multiple DUI Court
- Integrated Medication Assisted Treatment (IMAT) Team co-location with Correctional Health Services (CHS)
- Sobering Station Services
- (Partnership BHRS Mental Health) through Service Connect/AB109, Pathways Mental Health Court, Veteran's Treatment Court

Diversion

- **Deferred Entry (DEJ/PC1000) Pre-trial Diversion**
- Plead guilty to specified drug related charges
- Court ordered to participate in a 32-hour alcohol & drug education program of group counseling and individual counseling, and random observed urine analysis
- DEJ probation, usually for 12-18 months; Guilty plea dismissed at end of probation term with completion

Driving Under the Influence Programs

- **Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Programs**
- Wet & Reckless
 - 12-hour DUI education program required for those convicted of reckless driving with a measurable blood alcohol
- First Offender Program (FOP) (3-month / 6-month / 9-month programs)
 - For first DUI offenders; required program includes alcohol and drug education and counseling
- Multiple Offender Program (MOP) (12-month / 18-month programs)
 - For second and subsequent DUI offenders
 - Includes group counseling; alcohol and drug education; community reentry monitoring; and biweekly individual interviews

Collaborative Courts

- **Drug Court and Multiple DUI Court**
 - **Multiple DUI Court** is for 2nd and 3rd time DUI misdemeanor offenders, 6-month program
 - **Drug Court** is for nonviolent, diversion-eligible defendants; other eligibility criteria must be met, program is 18-24 months and is a voluntary program
- AOD staff are part of teams, attend weekly Court calendar, and host quarter team meetings for collaborative courts partners
- Ongoing case management and monitoring of clients in accordance with treatment court agreement; provides incentives to Drug Court clients when they meet milestones or goals; re-entry planning in collaboration with CHS, Probation, Sheriff's Office, etc.
- Referral: (via tele-health or in person) requests from Sheriff, Correctional Health Services, or Probation

Integrated Medication Assisted Treatment (IMAT) Services

- **Beneficial to those with:**

- Chronic, harmful Alcohol & Opioid use
- High utilization of SMMC Emergency Services (Emergency Department, PES)
- Criminal Justice or Law Enforcement involvement
- Motivated to reduce or stop alcohol or opioids

- **IMAT Case Manager will:**

- Conduct brief screening and collect background info
- Link to detox or safe sobering
- Begin intake, schedule initial appointment – usually w/in days
- Transport to first appointment
- Help fill prescriptions
- Assist with follow up referrals and other treatment needs



BHRS and In-Custody Partnerships

In-Custody Residential Treatment Evaluation and Reentry Coordination

- AOD “RTX” case managers complete in-custody treatment evaluations with 24 hour of request
- RTX Case manager complete treatment referral, re-entry coordination with CHS, probation, SO.

Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Access and Reentry coordination

- IMAT has 3 case managers with jail clearance who meet with incarcerated individuals virtually or in-person to conduct intakes and support with linkage to Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) post-incarceration.
- IMAT works closely the CHS team to coordinate these referrals and linkages.

New IMAT Case Manager co-location with CHS

- New IMAT case manager position will be co-located in the jail with CHS.
- IMAT CM to meet with inmates inside the jail who are interested in MAT post-incarceration and will provide field-based support to help ensure linkage to treatment after release.
- Collaborate closely with CHS, along with probation and parole to coordinate care and provide warm hand-offs.

AOD Housing Supports

Recovery Residences (RR)

- 62 contracted RR beds for men; women's RR beds coming soon
- RR provide secure, safe, and alcohol and drug free housing
- RR residents must be actively engaged in medically necessary SUD treatment or recovery support services
- RR do not provide substance use services on site or require licensure by DHCS
- Limited to short term stay of up to 24 months.
- May include those dependent children residing in the same location as the parent while the parent is receiving offsite SUD treatment (coming soon for women).

Sobering Living Homes

- Provide secure, safe, and alcohol and drug free housing
- Generally self-pay \$1,000 per month and open to the public
- The Drug Court program refers and funds Sober Living housing for eligible program clients

Shelter Plus Care Housing Vouchers

- Department of Housing voucher required for SUD housing subsidy
- Disability requirements in addition to history of substance use
- BHRS AOD staff provide case management support

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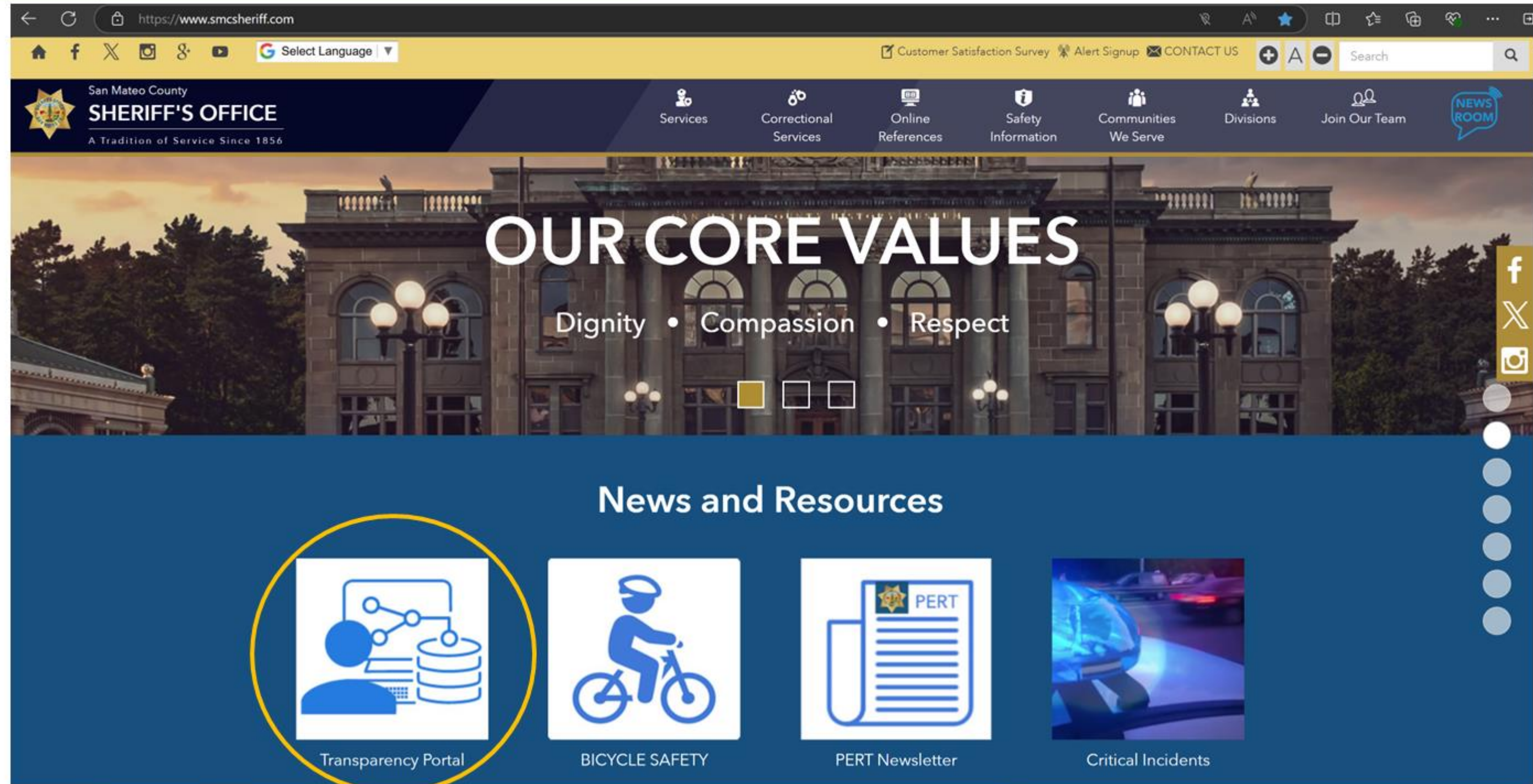

- Data Categories
 - Employee Demographics
 - Calls for Service
 - Complaints/IA Investigations/Use of Force
 - Evictions
 - Crimes/Arrests
 - Corrections
 - RIPA
- Data is refreshed on quarterly (calendar year), 2 quarters behind
 - Ex. October 16, 2024 is calendar year Q4, so data from Q2 (April-June 2024) is available

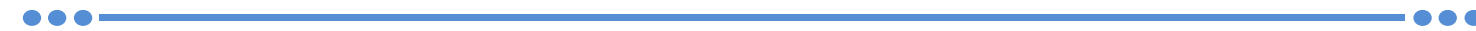
