What is Hazard Mitigation Planning?


The Hazard Mitigation Plan assesses hazard vulnerabilities and identifies mitigation actions that jurisdictions will pursue in order to reduce the level of injury, property damage, and community disruption that might otherwise result from such events.

Adoption of the Plan helps the County and its Annex Partners remain eligible for various types of pre and post disaster community assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the State government.



What is Mitigation?

"Sustained action taken to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to life and property"



Benefits of Hazard Mitigation Plans

- Establish eligibility for grant funds (\$\$\$ for projects)
- Improve understanding of risks and vulnerabilities
- Reduce negative impacts of natural hazards actions save lives, reduce displacement, and speed recovery
- Encourage sustainable actions builds strong, resilient, and self-sufficient communities
- Foster collaboration between local jurisdictions and residents

2021 Plan Update Successes

- ✓ In 2021, we have 36 Planning Partners.
 - In 2016, we had 29.
- ✓ In 2021, all 20 Cities/Townships in the County participated.
 - In 2016, 18 Cities/Townships participated.
- ✓ In 2021, we received over 2,000 survey responses from community members.
 - In 2016, we received 200 responses.
- ✓ In 2021, the Plan contains over 700 mitigation actions.
 - In 2016, the Plan contained 500 mitigation actions.


